Gareth's "Words on War" series begins this week... t 4.20 pm!! Why it's being shown at kids viewing time eats the hell out of me, but I long ago gave up trying to fathom the minds of TV programmers.

"Sapphire and Steel" has begun on ITV, Tuesday and Thursday evenings 7.00 till 7.30. Silly idea butting it on as two weekly parts. A one-hour show would suit the concept much better as the ideas behind the show are nicely worked out and rather scary. At 30 minutes, though, there's no way to capture and hold the attention and the audience's nerves.

The series looks good and should pick up, but it comes off as very slow and tepid as yet. The appalling credit sequences and the none-too-strong scripts don't help the situation, but Joanna and David McCallum play

off against one another well.

((Then, to some later comments on the show...))
I take back what I said previously about "Sapphire...".
The fourth show was on today and it really is turning into an excellent mystery item. Joanna is called upon to do more than her Purdey role ever allowed her the chance and there are some very weird and unsettling effects and ideas in the show.

"Billion Dollar Threat" is here now and I caught at on a double bill with an enjoyable youthsploitation movie called "That Summer". Wish I could say I enjoyed "Threat" to the same extent, but it really was limp, I have to admit. The only moments of uplift were when Pat was on-screen (a delight) and that one sequence where the hero, Sands, outdrives Horatio Black's villains and blows up their jeep with a shotgun-cumbazooka... the only time it came close to 007.

"King Solomon's Treasure" is on it town for a limited engagement and got a couple of quite favourable reviews: "...it's hard to dislike our three bluff neroes who miraculously survive rebellious priests, erupting volcanoes and tumbling cities to return to the old country with nothing but a tale to tell their grandchildren."

Rang Linda's home again today - she's back! We had a nice chat and we're meeting up for some teapefore she goes back to America to live on July 30th. She'll be settling there but says she'll be back to

London now and again. It only occured to me after we'd finished talking that the American guy who answered the phone was Cyril Smith and I think now that I'd like to have said something to him other than, "Could I speak to Linda, please?"!!

Linda was able to give me some details about "The Grass is Greener". Now, why was she able to when none of the West End Theatres could help me? Simple - the play isn't playing the West End at all. From July 30th it's going on a 6 month tour and this begins with seasons at Guildford's Yvonne Arnaud Theatre (where Linda was in "Murder in a Bad Light") and another theatre in Richmond.

The producers told me that rehearsals are at present going on at Guildford for the opening July 30th, the show running there until 18 August.

Next step: Ring Guildford and try to speak to Patrick, right? I got through during a break in rehearsals at 1 o'clock and he was absolutely charming! He sounded a little tired and said not to come and see the play until the second week when it had ironed itself out. Then, he said, we can meet up and have a few drinks. He then said how grateful (again) he was for your and our interest in him and how he looked forward to meeting me (HE looks forward to it!!??). Needless to say, I was amazed and delighted at getting through to Pat and I only wish you were here to see the play too.

I've been 'in bed' with mild flu for three days (bad enough to keep me away from the studio, but not so bad that I can't sunbathe and zip down to Aldwych and the telephone kiosk on the corner!) and was listening to the radio yesterday, twiddling the dial, when I came to Michael Aspel's morning show on Capital Radio. He was talking to Gareth Hunt!

I soon gathered that Gareth had been his guest for the past two hours and was plugging his new play. I flipped through the pages of "Time Out" to see what play he could possibly be in that I had missed and I finally found it - "Deathtrap" by Ira ("Boys from Brazil") Levin. Reason I'd overlooked it was the fact that Denis Quilley has been in the play for months and months (at the Garrick Theatre)

and Gareth Hunt took over only this last week.

Well, before you could say "linament" I was on the tube to town and three o'clock saw me enjoying "Deathtrap" once again. I can't reveal even the plot to you (one is sworn to secrecy!) but Gareth was quite brilliant in the role of murder playwright Sidney Bruhl - American accent and all. He was both very funny and eerily scary when called upon to do either and he had far more charm in his performance than the nonetheless excellent Denis Quilley. His hair was greyed-down to suggest middle age... I thought for a moment he'd actually gone grey!

Naturally I went backstage straightaway and as soon as I sent him a Network card he had me taken to his dressing room and we had a chat for about 5+7 minutes. Gareth went on that he enjoyed making the series "...knowing Brian and Joanna and Patrick, of course - great fun." I got him to sign a couple of programmes and asked about photos from the play. He wasn't sure what the situation was but wrote down my name and address and promised to get in touch with the guy concerned.

# "House of Cards"

Professor Vasil, the acclaimed professor is about to be returned unwillingly and unceremoniously to his homeland by his fellow countryman Perov. Their private plane waits on the tarmac of the small airfield to take them aloft.

Then there is a sudden burst of confusion in the airport lounge when several pop fans, all girls, go into a near frenzy at the sight of their hero. They stampede into the midst of Vasil and his captor, Perov, and two of his bodyguards. Perov is pinioned by the girls, the henchmen are swept underfoot and Vasil is gently escorted to a nearby car by Steed who had outwitted Perov. It was all part of a diversion set up by Steed, Purdey and Gambit.

Perov, veteran agent, who infiltrated thirteen agents into the country during the last 20 years is deadly and devious - the trickiest of them all. The names of Steed, Purdey and Gambit and Vasil, among others, are shuffled from his pack of deadly cards - a code system he has designed over the years. The king of hearts is the card with Steed's name on it. That is the code to kill Steed. Gambit's name is on the knave of hearts and Purdey is lined up to become the assassinated Queen of Hearts.

# Mrs. Peel - You're Needed!

The new fall season has begun on American TV and one can not help but notice that "The New Avengers" is missing from the CBS late night line-up. I have been inundated by letters asking when the series will be rerun and in what time slot. In hopes of setting things straight I will print here what information I have, both from England and from CBS-TV in New York.

Presently, I have no 'official' word from Avengers Enterprises in England concerning the show's future. However, I do have an article from the "Sunday People" dated September 2, 1979 which states that the producers plan to film another 26 episodes of "The New Avengers" (2 years) beginning early in 1980. The article quotes Brian Clemens as saying, "The show is a big hit in the States and the Americans have agreed to provide most of the finance for another 26 episodes. Other companies over here are also interested and it is now just a case of sorting out who puts in what."

A call to CBS on October 19 provided the following

information as they see things...

The original 26 "New Avengers" episodes did indeed stir great interest and plans are to rerun the series, but not until sometime next year - probably starting in the fall of 1980. CBS is in favor of filming more episodes and has been negotiating with Avengers Enterprises to obtain more. However, they do not have any confirmation that additional episodes have been agreed upon.

In lieu of showing "New Avengers" reruns this season, CBS has purchased 25 episodes of the <u>original</u> "Avengers" - color episodes, Diana Rigg era - and will begin airing them around the end of the year. Proposed


time slot? Wednesday nights at 12:40 am.



# Report from England

"The Grass is Greener" came and went and so did my two meetings with Pat Macnee. I went to see him at about 2.05 pm (the play began at 2.30) and then watched him make-up as we talked for about 10-12 minutes. Then I went off to watch him perform. It finished about 4.40 and then I gave Pat time to change and we had another (longer) chat until 5.15 when I managed to find my way back to London having finally met the great man!

Pat really is as charming, elegant and straight a man both as you could wish for and as he is reported. He looked very fit and bronzed (he had to make-down, not up!) and said he'd recently been playing a lot of tennis back in the States with people like Lee Majors, Peter Graves and James

MacArthur.

He asked if I'd seen Joanna's new show as he'd missed it and when I said it was fine except for the scripts he agreed by saying that Joanna had told him they'd been very dissatisfied with the scripts but hoped for a second series. He also mentioned how David McCallum was a "very dear man".

I spoke of how very good Gareth was in "Deathtrap" and that pleased him no end. He said he'd been offered the play Stateside but refused it because of "that horrible garrotting sequence. Horrible! I couldn't do that every night with all that blood." Nice touch of sensitivity on the person's part, I thought, rather than the actor's.

I mentioned that I'd caught "King Solomon's Treasure" and he was aghast - "Oh no, that's awful!" He said they'd made it during a brief lull from negotiations on TNA #1 back in December '76 and after they'd done their bit the special effects were done and "... they were so terrible they didn't dare release it. I'm surprised it's surfaced here at all." I assured him I'd found it great fun and that the saving grace had been the beautiful clear colour photography of Africa - certainly some of the best I've ever seen. Odd, considering the cheapness of the production.

## 'K' is for Kill

Part I 'The Tiger Awakes'

John Steed had called up Emma Peel after the peace of a village in England had been shattered on July 25, 1965 when a young Russian soldier had burst into an old nissen hut and machine gunned a Salvation Army band. The Russian had made off, leaping over an obstacle, falling and rolling and failing to rise to his feet again. The young soldier had suddenly changed into a very old man who died simply of old age. Steed told Mrs. Peel that it had been a problem which they might never solve. Until...

Three men in their early twenties had driven their jeep into a garage workshop in a small town in France on August 14, 1977. Within seconds they had been machine gunned by a young Russian soldier and the garage destroyed with a grenade. Steed had been contacted by Mrs. Peel - he left for France with Purdey and Gambit.

At the garage the owner survived and had talked over and over about a Russian soldier who launched the attack. Steed thought it tied up with the attack on the English village years previously. The three young men who died had worn ex-army surplus jackets which had given them a military appearance.

Outside the town the young Russian soldier observed Purdey, Gambit and Steed through a telescopic sight, about to fire on them until interrupte by a series of distant explosions. Gambit and Purdey raced off on a motor bike to investigate while Steed, with Frenchman Colonel Martin, went by car.

A Russian officer directed a mortar crew in an attack on a chateau as Steed's car had raced into view. Quickly they'd turned on it and raked the road with machine gun fire. Steed had spun the car and he and Martin had baled out as Purdey and Gambit roared onto the scene and crashed into a field under gun fire.

The chateau the Russians attacked had been

empty for years. Steed, Purdey, Gambit and Martin had been pinned down in a ditch as the soldiers made an orderly withdrawal. A sniper had creased Martin from a tree. Gambit, with a dynamic karate move, attacked the tree and got the Russian down with a dislocated neck. Purdey examined the Russian's pay-book and, according to it, the dead young Russian at her feet had been fifty-two years old.

The Russian officer and his soldiers had met up with another group of soldiers. They'd joined forces to attack further targets together. Steed and Martin poked around inside the chateau which thirty years previously had been the H.Q. of Allied Security. Outside a group of French Commandoes had prepared to go into action.

Gambit had been in the autopsy room as the doctor examined the Russian soldier - the body had suddenly aged to a man of fifty-two.

Colonel Martin told Steed that he hoped to contain the military operation as they seemed to be only up against a dozen or two crazy men. Further away, another large house was attacked by the Russians. Steed and Purdey had taken off in a helicopter to observe and direct Colonel Martin and his troops. As the Russians had started to split up, Steed and Purdey landed, determined to capture at least one Russian alive. Purdey caught a young Russian officer whose pay-book identified him as sixty-five years old.

Gambit and the doctor who had witnessed instant old age had found something buried into the brain which looked like a small radio transmitter.

An elderly Frenchman had recognised the captured Russian officer from before the war and thought it must be the Russian's son until a fencing scar proved otherwise. The Russian made a bid to escape. Gambit shot him and again the Russian's body aged immediately.

In Russia, they realised with horror that a satellite had gone wrong and emitted a full strength signal over France for twenty-two minutes, activating several units of commandoes... a secret army which they now had to destroy. The Russians had prepared for World War III with the aid of something they'd discovered in Tibet... The Sleeping Dragon.

Steed received a call from the Russian Ambassador in Paris warning him about the possibility of World War III. As Steed turned to Purdey and Gambit, a Russian machine gun opened fire on them...

## Part II 'Tiger by the Tail'

John Steed, Purdey and Gambit had found themselves caught up in a war situation in France. Young Russian soldiers had started appearing in groups hell bent on attacking targets thirty years out of date. When killed, the Russians' bodies had aged almost instantly. How many Russians were involved? What were their objectives? Steed had been warned by the Russian Ambassador to Paris that they were on the brink of World War III.

Steed, Purdey and Gambit had been pinned down by gunfire in a large house by an isolated group of Russian soldiers overlooked by the French paras until Gambit had managed to break out and kill them.

Helped by the Frenchman, Colonel Martin, they'd examined the map carried by the Russians which contained targets that no longer existed, confirming they were up against a small army with out-of-date equipment attacking out-of-date military targets. They decided to find out more by interrogating the prisoners.

The temporary Prisoner-of-War base proved to have no prisoners left to interrogate. They had all died from natural causes... old age, total degeneration, a speeded up process of senility. The doctor had performed an autopsy on several of the dead men and removed a radio device from each of their skulls. Purdey and Gambit checked out the effects of the dead men and found in the hinged shoe of one of the Russians, a deposit slip dated February 1946... St. Ceir Depository.

The Russian Ambassador to Paris had discovered that the 250 Russians the French had either rounded up or killed were not the entire force. There had been two more - two K-Agents on special assignment.

Inside the St. Ceir Depository a dusty, neglected crate had been smashed open and Minsky, a K-Agent, emerged, pausing only to kill a workman who'd questioned him. Purdey and Gambit arrived too late.

The Russian Ambassador barely escaped arrest in his own embassy and raced to find Steed and warn him as Gambit and Purdey had toured the depositories unaware of the danger they were up against. Turkov, the second K-Agent, had left his hiding place minutes ahead of Gambit and Purdey's arrival. He'd left one small, terrifying clue... a long range magnum bullet with an explosive tip - an assassin's bullet.

The Russian Ambassador had reached Steed and warned him about the small armies planted in every European country by a method of suspended animation. Guerilla fighters hidden in various storehouses sleeping a scientifically induced sleep to be awakened by a radio signal to a transmitter buried in the brain. The two K-Agents had been highly trained assassins who, if they reached their targets, his pursuer gunned him down.

Gambit took his training to the ultimate when dealing with almost certain death from a gun shot. Minsky, the K-Agent, had been shot down after he killed General Gaspard, an old war hero. Steed had warned the French Minister to tighten security on the President.

Gaspard was to have a V.I.P. funeral attended by the President at a closely guarded military cemetary. Steed, Purdey and Gambit realised that the photo of Gaspard Minsky carried had been supplied recently... Gaspard had been a set-up for the real target - the French President. They raced to the funeral. Turkov had already concealed himself there. Would they be too late? Where was Turkov? The President had arrived... the assassin's gun had been lined up. Could Steed, Purdey and Gambit prevent the inevitable?

## LOCs of Gold

Jacky Fulton - Ottawa, Ontario, Canada:

I had no idea there was an "Avengers" club. I've been a fan for years. I prefer the early series with Emma Peel and the others, but I do have a great passion for Gambit. If he had been in the early lot I'd have been in heaven!

When I was in England my last boss was Ralph Sheldon and he edited the "New Avengers" - or every other one really... Bob (Dearberg) did the others. I never met any of them, but it was very interesting to see the scripts Ralph brought over from the studio before the series was out. They all looked highly confusing as they contained all his written comments as well as the writers'.

Your remarks about the Americanization of "The New Avengers" is quite true. Ralph often said that people were unhappy with the way things were going, but since the Canadian TV folks had a vested interest in the new series their hands were tied somewhat. Foreign money wanted a sophisticated image... the sort that came with a large budget rather than good taste.

I've just been reading the LOCs at the back of the Newsletter. The one that caught my eye was from Cheryl Huffey from Essex, England (I lived there most of my life - small world, really). She says that "... anyone worth his salt should know that "The Avengers" were John Steed and Cathy Gale." I'm not actively disagreeing with her, but it seems to me that "The Avengers" were different things to different people. To me, Steed will always be paired with Emma Peel. The chemistry was right between them, Diana Rigg was and is a very fine actress and the strength of their relationship carried them through as much as the stories.

I never cared for Cathy Gale or Tara King... they never 'felt' right to me. The modern "Avengers" have managed to capture that elusive togetherness and caring that characterized Steed and Mrs. Peel's relationship. As usual, the caring is never voiced (or very rarely) and this is, I think, the secret

# 'Target'

Five top agents, McKay, Potterton, Talmadge, Palmer and Myers all die of natural causes within just more than a month. Meanwhile, Draker, a man in the shadows, gloats.

Dr. J. Kendrick, the doctor who carried out the post mortems on the five, insists on the cause of death - natural causes. Were the deaths due to overwork, for example? Steed can't understand. Natural causes? Five agents? All within four or five weeks. All had just been declared A.1. The doctor is ordered to look more closely. But Draker knew the reason because they were victims of his killing machine... poison. Subtle, faultless and undetectable That is what he believed along with a compatriate, Colonel Ilenko, who had arrived in the country to observe Draker's annihilation of the agents in the manner of the Ten Little Indians.

Then Dr. Kendrick does look more closely and on Myer's body he traces three tiny marks, barely pin pricks under a microscope; also on Palmer and Talmadge. Gambit and Steed recall that each of the dead agents were about to go on leave and they had also just had their practical test; target practice on the intricate shooting range which is, in fact, a mock-up street with houses, shops and cut out characters of life size men and women which controls a sophisticated push button set up which activates revolver, rifle, machine gun fire along with a precision method of hurling hand grenades in the mock-up street. All this to keep agents aware of a vast permutation of the ways they can be gunned down or blown to bits.

If they are hit by Bradshaw's cardboard assassins a red spot appears on their clothing. Bradshaw actually controlled more than Steed then knew about. He is a Draker puppet with sharp shooting talents that kill his colleagues instead of teaching them gun fire survival. Both Purdey and Steed have been hit by Draker's killing machine,

minute slivers of glass dipped into a South American poison called curare and they are slowly dying while Gambit finds himself in a furore of shattering cross fire delivered by a desperate Draker on the target range.

I've given as much thought, and maybe a wee bit more, as I could afford to the question of what we know about Gambit. Having not seen all the episodes, and being a little slow on the uptake (especially late at night), I'm having a little trouble separating what I've gleaned from the series and what I've come up with in my own mind. So I'll just free-associate for awhile...

Besides the obvious (that he's gorgeous), I do know that Gambit is dangerous - possibly the most

dangerous man I've ever seen. Even more so than John Drake or Number 6 (I personally consider them one and the same). Under the calm, efficient exterior is a power that I wouldn't want to be on the wrong side of!

And he is efficient. Truly an extraordinary agent. However, he goes a little too much by the book, which was his downfall when Purdey was kidnapped. Steed doesn't always play by the rules and was able to get the best of him.

He depends less on intellect than does Steed and usually goes in with hands flailing or gun blasting. My favorite example of this is in the cybernaut episode when, at the end, Gambit bursts in holding his spray can exactly the way he holds his gun.

While I wouldn't want to have him as an enemy, I think he's priceless as a friend and ally. I can't exactly say that his loyalty is unwavering (during "Hostage" he was torn between duty to the Service and loyalty to Steed - caught between a rock and a hard place, you might say) but it does take a major catastrophe to shake it.

On top of all his other good qualities, Gambit has a terrific sense of humor. He may be hopelessly in love with Purdey, but that doesn't stop him from joking with her about it (which probably keeps him from going off the deep end because of the hopelessness of the situation) and enjoying the company of assorted young lovelies. There is a lot of humor in his interchanges with Purdey - her feelings about Steed (which may turn into another essay!), he dumping her out of bed, she returning the favor and so forth. And the glint he gets in his eyes...! Like at the end of "Hostage", when Purdey is telephoning Steed's latest lady friend to explain because "... She thinks I'm inordinately fond of you." Gambit looks at her with his heart in his eyes, yes, but a hint of mocking too and says, "Silly, foolish girl."

In response to your comment ((last issue)) - I think at least two episodes should be filmed in middle America ((if "The New Avengers" continue)). While Colorado is more scenic, I won't be there. So, Omaha is next best 'cuz we'll all let Pat ride our ponies.

# Forward Base

The New Avengers is definitely the best new show of the season. Purdey and Gambit are delightful, with Purdey cool and unflappable on the surface, and Gambit the man of passion. I started liking Gambit in the episode about the robbers putting everyone to sleep. Anyone who can care about a sparrow isn't all bad! And also, I now realize that the "I'm looking forward to it!" is a running joke on the show.

## LIV BOTTUM, Ann Arbor, MI:

I've been watching "The New Avengers" and I like it very much. I find the relationships between the characters quite interesting. Steed and Mike are so chummy. I get the feeling that Purdey is sort of the 'odd man out'. I feel they all like and respect each other very much and that both Steed and Gambit think Purdey is terrific, but that Steed lets Gambit 'in' more than he does Purdey.

"Obsession" was fascinating. It shed a whole new light on the Steed/Purdey relationship. In this episode Gambit was the one who was out in the cold! Purdey, of course, didn't give him a chance to be anything but left in the dark. When she was turning down the cushy security assignment, for example, she was ostensibly talking to both Steed and Gambit but her eyes never left Steed, silently asking him to understand without pressing her for explanations. And Steed was remarkably quick at catching on.

Steed was enormously supportive of Purdey at the party, reminding her of Berlin as Larry entered and asking how she was feeling afterwards. That support and understanding without demands for explanations must have been enormously helpful to Purdey. That's what Gambit couldn't provide. He would ask to be told everything. He said to Steed, "I think there's a lot you're not telling me." Steed answered, "There's a lot she's not telling me, but I wouldn't dream of asking!" Terrific! Friends like Steed are rare.

There was a scene after Steed's friend has been killed ((from "Angels of Death")) - Steed and Gambit are talking and Steed finally says something indicating how bad he feels about his friend. Gambit hadn't really been picking up on Steed's feelings of grief. He leaves, Purdey comes in and she immediately makes some remark indicating she's sensitive to how Steed must be feeling. But Steed can't accept it from her. When his guard was down from being drugged he did allow a close moment with Purdey - when they were trapped in the maze. And in "Obsession" Steed was enormously sensitive to Purdey's feelings and very supportive of her. It seems that although he can't accept her help he can offer his own. Fascinating!

The Purdey/Gambit relationship is pretty interesting, too. The use of last names symbolizes the necessity of keeping an emotional distance simply because a deep involvement between them would be natural in other circumstances. They keep a professional distance because a personal involvement can't even be thought of or acknowledged. Vaguely reminiscent of Steed and Mrs. Peel in that aspect.

I think it was wise of the show's creators to give Steed two partners. The change in format lets the viewer avoid any direct comparisons between this team and the duo of Steed and the imcomparable Mrs. Peel.

Reading through the Newsletters I was struck once again by something I really enjoy about "Fandom" - the 'it's such a small world, isn't it?' phenomenon. The same names tend to crop up. Steve Eramo, for example, has been quite active in "Space: 1999" fandom. I enjoy reading his contributions to the Newsletter. I really enjoy being part of the community. And I'm always amazed

## MIKE GAMBIT

It seems to me that Mike Gambit is a bit neglected. I myself, am a Mike Gambit fan and believe that addin a third member to the team was a great idea on Mr. Clemens part.

Adding Gambit could be compared to the time when Diana Rigg left the series and Linda Thorson entered. Noone really liked her at first-she wasn't Mrs. Peel, wasn't intended to be, but for 20 years old, she was a great actress and handled the part quite well. After a while, fan mail began to come in for Linda apologizing for being so down on her.

I'm sure that if it were only Steed and Purdey, the show would still be a success. But, somehow Mike Gambit makes the show that much better. Some say that he's a "one-dimensional character"- that the scripts limited the development of his character. I think he's a great, well developed character myself. He cares for his two friends very much and would give his life for them. In TARGET, Gambit was prepared to go to the ends of the earth if Purdey died to find the ones who poisoned her. Take K is for Kill after rescuing Purdey from the Russian agent she replies "Gambit, your hand" "It's nothing" he replies. His concern is for Steed, whom he spotted from the road, laying face down on the balcony. Dirtier By The Dozen-Purdey doesn't realize she's in a mine field. She gets a bit angry when Mike shoots at her, but when the mine explodes, she realizes he was trying to save her life.

I never saw Gareth Hunt until the New Avenger episode "Eagle's Nest." I immediately

reslized that there was something special about him. By the end of the show, I was hooked on Mike Gambit. Let's give the guy a chance shall we. He's really great-dashing, debonair.....

Come on, there must be some more MIKE GAMBIT fans out there!
