At 100 yards I thought it had to come. No cut, and Joanna was still going like an avenging angel. She finally finished her Olympic-like sprint, having covered best part of 300 yards. With no cut in the action.

When I met her in her dressing room at Pinewood studios, where she is filming a new Avenger series, she told me that she really didn't know a thing about karate or judo.

I glanced down and thought her legs would look pretty good, straight or crossed. And decided to start shooting pics before I got too carried away.
For shots inside the dressing room, while Joanna was chatting to my reporter, I used a Nikon with 85 mm and 50 mm lenses, working at $1 / 60 \mathrm{sec}$ at $\mathrm{f} / 2.8$ on Tri-X. But the pics I really wanted were of her in action as Purdey, and for these I planned to use a 21 mm . Then I hit the snag which inevitably occurs in film studios. Joanna

Above, taking a break from her "Avenger"exertions (85mm Nikkor)was called to the set, where she was being filmed in what looked like a fairground ghost-train tunnel, and in which she is dragged in chains by two heavies who stop her cry of "Steed!" by forcibly stuffing an apple in her mouth.
I waited for her to finish the first take. The director wasn't happy. So they did a second. And a third. In fact, they did eight takes (by which time Joanna had a cut lip from the apple being pushed in a little extra vigorously) before he called the magic words: "OK. Print that one".

I moved in to take Joanna outside for my pictures. But they already had her chained to the trolley being prepared for some other fate worse (well, almost) than death.

I could see the whole day slipping by before I got my pictures. But here I must offer a sincere word of thanks to Patrick Macnee, who has been the star of the series for 13 years. He asked me what the problem was, and I told him there seemed no way I could get Joanna away for a few minutes without disrupting the whole sequence. He went straight up to the director and, within seconds, I had Joanna to myself, complete with villain George Lane Cooper and the fight arranger.

First I pictured her giving a good right hook to George's chin, and then I had her give one of her famous karate kicks, straight at the camera. She did these with the speed of a ballet dancer, and I shot at $1 / 500 \mathrm{sec}$ at $\mathrm{f} / 5.6$, aiming to get my picture when her boot was nearest the lens. After half a dozen, I was fairly satisfied that one of them would be right, and I looked up from the viewfinder for the final kick. That 21 mm lens had given me a false sense of security, as I discovered that the kick was passing just about two inches in front of my lens. Glad I hadn't annoyed her. An accident could have happened so easily.
