AVENGER ENTERPRISES, the company set up by the successful writer/producer team of Brian Clemens and Albert Fennell following their purchase of the rights to The Avengers series, is now resurrecting ace-agent John Steed.

Clemens explained: "Although The Avengers hasn't been on the screen here for some six years, it has hardly been off the screen in America. We've been trying to set up a new series for some time now and about six months ago Rudolph Roffi, who heads an independent French film and TV company, offered to put up the money to make an initial series of 13 episodes."

The part of Steed is, again, to be taken by Patrick Macnee (below). No decision has yet been reached about who will co-star with him.

Clemens' own non-stop career has recently reached new heights with three stage plays either on tour and waiting to go into the West End of London or, in the case of one play, waiting to go direct to the West End.

I like gentle people. I would have done anything he said.


